The session ahead - Nature's Rights

Members of the House of Lords can table Private Members Bills which enter a ballot. Where our bills come in the ballot dictates whether there will be time for them to be heard, the bills that come top get taken first.

In the ballot on Friday 15th May Natalie's bill on Nature's Rights came second! This means there will be enough time for the bill to be considered and hopefully pass all its stages in the House of Lords in order to proceed to the House of Commons.

NATURE'S RIGHTS BILL - A BILL TO recognise Nature as a legal subject; establish and protect the rights of Nature; establish a legal duty of care for public bodies, businesses, and individuals; provide procedural rights for the protection of Nature; establish an Integrated Rights Framework; establish mechanisms for dispute resolution and legal enforcement; establish a Nature Guardianship Council and

Bioregional Councils; establish a Nature's Rights Tribunal; create a governance structure for implementation and integration; provide for phased implementation and periodic review; ensure compliance with international environmental obligations; promote public awareness and education; and for connected purposes.

Jenny's bill on Marine Protected Areas was not successful in the ballot, she can still table it again later but it is very unlikely there will be time for it to be considered.

MARINE PROTECTED AREAS (Bottom Trawling) (England) Bill - A BILL TO prohibit the practice of bottom trawling in Marine Protected Areas in England; and for connected purposes.
